But he will not be the only Giant Tiger employee who will be donning a colourful new hairdo.

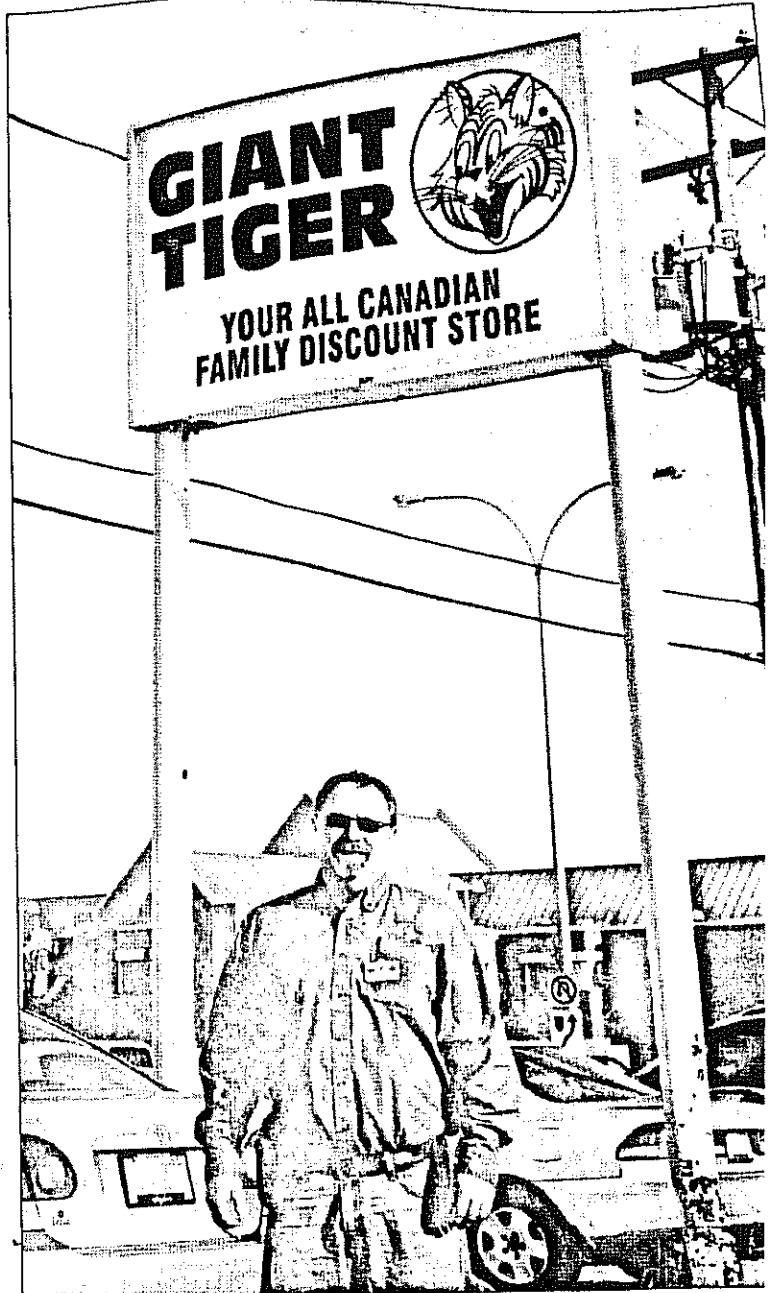
Two cashiers have also agreed to have their hair dyed — one if more than \$2,000 was raised and the other if more than \$2,500 was raised.
