How \$0.25 can make a million dollar impact

Northern/NorthMart Greener Tomorrow program celebrates its 5th year generating over \$1.6 million for local community initiatives

Winnipeg, April 21, 2016 – Earth Day 2016 will mark the 5th anniversary of The North West Company's (North West) Greener Tomorrow program aimed at reducing plastic bag use in communities served by its Northern and NorthMart stores.

Greener Tomorrow, which launched in 2011 in 28 Nunavut and northern Quebec communities, encourages customers to switch to an environmentally friendly alternative by charging a \$0.25 fee for plastic bags. The funds collected from the sale of plastic bags are then reinvested in full into community programing.

To date, Greener Tomorrow has generated over \$1.6 million which has supported community cleanups, garbage bin programs, the beautification of playgrounds, and the creation of greenhouses and sports parks. The program has also provided added support for youth programing in the community, as well as food banks and school meal programs. In addition to the great positive impact the funds have had, Greener Tomorrow has successfully reduced plastic bag use by an estimated 69%, eliminating approximately 14 million bags from landfills.

During the 2015 - 2016 program year, Northern and NorthMart customers used 72% less bags, eliminating an estimated 2.7 million shopping bags from landfills across our communities and raised over \$327,000. This year the program expanded beyond the Nunavut and northern Quebec regions to include nine new communities in Ontario, Manitoba and Newfoundland.

"This program is a simple step that carries significant environmental benefits, including reducing the number of plastic bags that end up in landfills. Much of the success is thanks to our customers' willingness to embrace the use of reusable bags," said Christine Reimer, Vice President, Sales and Operations, The North West Company.

"Our customers contributed \$327,000 to the program in 2015/2016, all of which was reinvested in local community initiatives, including recycling programs, community clean ups, breakfast programs and food banks. Greener Tomorrow has been a great success and we hope to continue its growth to other interested communities this year." added Reimer.

How Greener Tomorrow Works

When a community elects to implement Greener Tomorrow in their Northern/NorthMart store, the staff will work with the community leadership to communicate the program change to the community. Northern/NorthMart distributes two free reusable shopping bags to each household to support the use of environmentally friendly alternatives. Once the program is initiated, a \$0.25 fee is charged when a plastic bag is sold.

A community may elect to join the program any time throughout the year. Funds are collected each year (April 1 – March 31) and then distributed in full to a community initiative, selected by the community leadership. All funds collected stay in the community in which they were raised.

Community Presentation
